Articles published per year: The journal publishes an average of 20 articles per year.

Minimum and maximum length of articles: Between 1,500 and 6,000 words

Languages of submission: Spanish, English, and Portuguese

Translation policy: The journal features original articles in Spanish and Portuguese, as well as unpublished translations from English and other languages.

Peer review process: Double-blind peer review system for over 80% of the articles

Approximate acceptance rate: 30%

Disciplines covered: Social Sciences and Humanities

Editorial philosophy: The Journal promotes critical thought in the field of social sciences and humanities, from a rigorous, pluralistic and democratic perspective, linking academic points of view with the political, social and cultural realities of Latin America and the Caribbean. It also aims to publish the output of researchers from CLASCO's network, in many cases, from countries that do not always have the tools to disseminate their academic and scientific output. The journal promotes current debates, linking different traditions of thought, and creating a rapprochement between the academic sphere and a wider public, as well as channel discussions between different intellectual traditions of critical, plural and democratic thought from a South-South perspective.

Use of photographs or graphics: In the printed version monochrome photographs and graphics are used; in the digital version the original colors are respected.

Are proposals for special guest-edited thematic issues considered? The Journal is structured by themes and central debates, arising from Editorial Council meetings.

Other special features about the journal: The Journal is available for free download in various digital formats (PDF, Epub, and Mobi) through open access; and for purchase through the Latin American and Caribbean Library of Social Sciences.

Planned future developments: The journal has increased the participation on behalf of Asian and African researchers by incorporating their research work and engaging this work with Latin American and Caribbean production. The journal is indexed by Latindex and REDALyC.
